This memo is being provided as an update for the recruitment for City Manager. The recruitment is on schedule with the brochure having been completed and sent out, and advertising begun. Frank Rojas, with CPS Consulting, has reached out to potential applicants and is very pleased with the interest for this position.

It was the desire of the sub-committee to obtain input from our community for criteria for a new City Manager. To this end, a Community Forum Meeting has been scheduled for Thursday, March 12, from 5:30-7:30 pm in the CMC B Room. A news release is being prepared to advertise this meeting.

Additionally, a survey has been created and is available as of tomorrow, Feb. 27th. The survey is comprised of just three questions and will be available in four languages. Hard copies of the survey will be available in all City buildings for visitors who want to fill them out and return them immediately.

The survey is conveniently available online, and is being publicized on social media and our Garden Grove website, as well as traditional media. It can be found at https://www.surveymonkey.com/s/GGCityManager

The City is also emailing the survey to our special events list, which is around 200 plus subscribers. We have also asked the Chamber to blast the survey out to their 600 businesses.

Obtaining community input is an important component to this recruitment and we are hopeful of a good response to the survey, as well as high turnout for the Community Forum.

The final filing date for this recruitment is March 23, after which time Mr. Rojas will conduct preliminary interviews. A report of candidates will be provided to the City near the end of March.

Stolen Vehicle Reporting Program: During the parking citation process, Staff utilizes the City's Stolen Vehicle Records System to identify and report stolen vehicles to the Police Department. This process has helped the Police Department reduce recovery time. In 2014, staff helped identify 38 stolen vehicles.	In support of reducing gang violence by improving aesthetics in our city, Department Staff completed over 1,600 graffiti abatement work orders from November 1, 2015 to February 18, 2015.	Tet Festival 2014: In support of this event, Street's Staff repaved 96,000 sq ft parking lot at the Garden Grove Park over the course of approximately 2 1/2 weeks. In order to expedite this process, normal operations were placed on hold during the duration of this project.	Park Playground Surface Assessment: Over the past year, Staff has been addressing repairs at playround surfaces in various park sites. At this time, Staff is facing playground surface sites beyond repair that are greately deteriorating due to age, weather, heavy usage and vandalism. These specific playground surface sites inloude the following, in order of severity: Eastgate, Woodbury, Magnolia, Gutosky and Pioneer. All of these sites are averaging 15 years old and industry standards recommend replacement every 7-10 years. In addition to age, these surfaces are less shock absorbing and pose risk for trip and fall hazards (e.g. serious head injuries). Additional funding is needed to fully replenish the removed inventory. Each tree costs approximately \$765 Trees Replanting Plan: As part of last year's Tree Removal & Replacement SOP, Staff developed a replanting plan that targets all of the existing empty tree following: 31% California Pepper, 23% Jacaranda, 15% Long Leafed Yellowwood, 6% Pordocarpus Gracilior, 4% Pink Trumpet. Based on community input, in contractor fees for planting, annual trimming for the first 3 years and watering weekly for the first year (all components are necessary for root growth and without business licenses are referred to the Finance Department's Business License Tax Section. On average, Staff replaces 40 trees per year and removes 210 trees, based on existing resources. drought tolerant plants and a high efficiency irrigation system. The energy efficiency project involves installing solar panels on the roof of the Lampson Tree Replanting Survey Poll. Following the communities' response to the removal of a California Pepper Tree on Elizabeth Ln and Stanford Ave, Staff posted a survey on the Department's facebook in February to seek community input on the type of tree to replant at this site. The results showed the Reservoir site that would increase operational efficiencies by hedging against rising energy costs and will increase water supply reliability for water customers. A total of \$1.1 million of grant funding is being requested and a total \$1.4 million of water enterprise funds will be committed. Dear Mayor Nguyen,

Effective October 1, 2012, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) assigned, and the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) assumed, all the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) Secretary's responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) pursuant to 23 USC 327(a)(2)(A). Caltrans assumed all of FHWA's responsibilities under NEPA for projects on California's State Highway System (SHS) and for federal-aid local streets and roads projects under FHWA's Surface Transportation Project Delivery Program. Caltrans also assumed all of FHWA's responsibilities for environmental coordination and consultation under other federal environmental laws pertaining to the review or approval of projects under NEPA Assignment. For the purposes of carrying out the responsibilities assumed under NEPA Assignment, Caltrans is deemed to be acting as FHWA with respect to the environmental review, consultation, and other actions required under those responsibilities.

Caltrans, as the lead agency, in coordination with the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) as the funding agency and the Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE) as cooperating agency, is in the process of producing a joint Final Environmental Impact Report/ Environmental Impact Statement (EIR/EIS) for the Interstate 405 (I-405) Improvement Project (approximately 16 miles long) in Orange and Los Angeles Counties, California, between State Route (SR) 73 and I-605.

In accordance with the Efficient Environment Review Process codified at 23 USC 139, Caltrans is notifying your agency that the Preferred Alternative (PA) identified by the Project Development Team (PDT) on July 24, 2014 was Alternative 3 which proposes to add one GP lane plus one tolled Express lane in each direction, such that this tolled Express lane and the existing HOV lane would be managed

jointly as a tolled Express Facility. The two other Build Alternatives under consideration were Alternative 1 which proposed to add one GP lane in each direction and Alternative 2 which proposed to add two GP lanes in each direction.

This PA identification was made after considering all information in the Draft EIS/EIR, Supplemental Draft EIS/EIR, and technical studies. It was also based on extensive input from the internal PDT members, public, stakeholders, interested citizens, cooperating agency (ACOE), federal, state, regional, and local agencies during the project development process. Extensive public outreach/ coordination resulted in comments from the public and agencies; all comments have been carefully considered during the PA process. Consideration was given to all issues raised, including the complexity of the project, shortage of funding, public concerns, project purpose and need, as well as project's environmental/ economic/ social impacts. The PDT used the following evaluation criteria:

- Reduce congestion on GP/HOV lanes
- Enhance & optimize Operations
- Increase Mobility
- Improve trip reliability
- Maximize throughput
- Minimize environmental impacts and ROW acquisition
- · Address Peak-period traffic demand that exceeds capacity in GP & HOV lanes
- Address mainline operational & geometric deficiencies
- Address interchange deficiencies
- · Address limitations in technological infrastructure

All three Build Alternatives would meet the project's purpose and need by reducing congestion; enhancing operations; increasing mobility; improving trip reliability, maximizing throughput, and optimizing operations; and by minimizing environmental impacts and right of way acquisitions. The No Build Alternative would not meet the project purpose and need but serves as a baseline against which to compare the Build Alternatives.

The three Build Alternatives would generally have similar social and economic impacts with Alternative 3's impacts being slightly more than Alternative 2 and Alternative 2's being slightly more than Alternative 1's impacts. The avoidance, minimization, and mitigation measures would also be generally similar for most resource areas.

During the PA identification process, it was noted that the cities within the corridor had general opposition towards tolling and supported adding one General Purpose (GP) lane. As a result, the OCTA Board in 2012 and 2013 selected Alternative 1as its preferred alternative.

The PDT concluded that although social and economic impacts, as noted above, were generally similar for all three Build Alternatives, people throughput; maximizing performance of existing system; trip reliability and long-term congestion relief were substantially different for the three build alternatives. Increased vehicle throughput for build alternatives, mobility for 2040 by peak hour throughput, average daily traffic, and travel-time savings for all Alternatives is given in the table below. It depicts that Alternative 3, the identified PA, is the most beneficial as compared to Alternative 1 and 2 and best fulfills the purpose and need of the project.

All Build Alternatives would result in operating improvements. However, Alternative 3 has lower travel times and higher travel speeds as compared to Alternatives 1 and 2. Also, Alternatives 1 and 2 have higher travel times and lower travel speeds due to less capacity. General purpose lanes will not deliver service life for the design year as demand exceeds capacity. But managed lanes can preserve mobility beyond the design year.

Although, the construction costs would be higher for Alternative 3 as compared to Alternatives 1 and 2, the revenue generation from toll collection, the operational benefits in the long run, and carpool encouragement would outweigh any increase in construction cost.

Due to all of the reasons mentioned above, the PDT reached a consensus and Alternative 3 was identified as the Preferred Alternative, the alternative to move forward for design and construction.

In accordance with the Efficient Environment Review Process codified at 23 USC 139, we inform the City of Garden Grove, as a participating/cooperating agency, about the PA for the I-405 Improvement Project. Our next major step in the NEPA Process will be to finalize the Final EIS and announce its proposed action to the public.



- the site.
 Find a project that uses the existing site but requires zoning-code changes.
- Demolish the structure in conjunction with construction of a different building.
- Demolish the structure before a replacement project is found.

It's still a behemoth on Garden Grove Boulevard. It's still a steel skeleton.

It's still, Garden Grove officials and residents say, a scab on the face of the city.

But the unfinished, 90foot-tall structure of steel beams that was supposed to become the Garden Grove Galleria shopping center soon may become something the city can be proud of.

After years of legal and economic tangles, the eightlevel structure now has seven developers vying to build something - from a commercial space to a mixed-use pro-perty – and the two biggest pieces of the puzzle, longtime property owner the Hoag Foundation and Cathay Bank, the lender for any pro-

ject, are now cooperating.
"We're on the same page now," said Scott Weimer, vice

July 12, 2005: City Council approves the Garden Grove Galleria project, which was to be massive mixed-use shopping. center.

Jan. 12, 2007: The city issues building permits so the development can move forward.

February 2010: Garden Grove Galleria files a lawsuit against Cathay Bank be-cause, it said, the bank stopped funding the project.

March 22, 2010: Garden Grove Galleria tells the city that it has stopped work on the project.

September 2011: Garden Grove Galleria terminates its lease with the Hoag Foundation.


January 2012: A new developer, Lotus Plaza, steps in to develop a new project

vising the existing structure.

Aug. 31, 2012: A jury awards Garden
Grove Galleria \$11,275,000. Cathay Bank
appeals (the process is underway today).

Dec. 18, 2014: Hoag Foundation board votes against the Lotus Plaza project, citing several concerns including not

enough parking. February 2015: Hoag Foundation and Cathay Bank begin accepting proposals for potential developers and have seven suitors, including a refined proposal from the Lotus Plaza developers.




But first, the city needs to be persuaded not to enforce a demolition order that was supposed to go into effect Dec. I. Hoag representatives asked at Tuesday's council meeting for a one-year extension. No decision was made.


Shipping containers are visible on the first floor of the unfinished steel structure of the Garden Grove Galleria.







Settlement with ex-fire chief is legal, consultant says

Report says
Garden Grove

GARDEN GROVE • The city's settlement with former fire Chief David Barlag is legal, protected Garden Grove from a possible lawsuit, and was "not a gift of public funds," says an eight-page report by an outside attorney hired by the city.

The city showed "a good faith and substantial effort to comply with the Brown Act and be transparent," attorney Alan Burns said in his report.

Mayor Bao Nguyen, who asked for the report, said Burns' conclusions show that the the city needs to be more proactive in clarifying its hiring policies.

"I'm satisfied with the report in terms of legal consideration," said Nguyen, noting that he still wants to see what the Orange County District Attorney's Office finds during its investigation. "But if there is nothing illegal, that doesn't

mean we can't put policies in place so these things don't happen in the future."

Barlag, who became shrouded in controversy over the hiring of a former mayor's son and the department's handling of hazardous-materials inspections, signed a settlement with Garden Grove on Sept. 30 – the same day he resigned from the department after 28 years.

The settlement was approved by the City Council during a public meeting before November's election changed the panel's makeup. The contract, though, says the agreement should be kept confidential to the extent permitted by law.

Whether the agreement was transparent enough is one of the elements the D.A.'s Office is looking into, said interim City Manager Allan Roeder.

Before his resignation, Barlag, who received a vote of no-confidence from the firefighters' union in June 2014, may have found "working conditions intolerable and believed termination was likely," Burns' report said.

In October 2013, former Mayor Bruce Broadwater's son was hired despite a criminal record; 10 firefighters were hired out of 500 candidates. Later, superiors recommended that he be fired for poor performance.

Further, city documents say the department inspected nearly 100 businesses with hazardous materials in 2012, but a Register investigation found that wasn't the case even though the department charged the businesses more than \$150,000 collectively.

The settlement keeps Barlag employed for two years in return for him not pursuing a wrongful-termination suit against the city. The former chief, who declined comment through the City Clerk's Office, has a \$226,380 salary.

In the months between the deal being struck and February, Barlag was rarely seen around City Hall, Nguyen and Roeder said.

Since Feb. 1, though, Barlag has reported regularly to City Hall and has specific responsibilities, such as working on the city's emergency preparedness and searching for a new location for Fire Station No. 6, which is currently a converted house, Roeder said.

Nguyen, who came from Palm Springs with his wife, Tram Le, and attends the festivals most years. "But there should be more decorations, so it feels more like a Lunar New Year festival instead of a regular carnival."

The Costa Mesa Festival, hosted by the Union of Vietnamese Student Associations, had a younger and more diverse crowd Friday.

The UVSA's festival, though, also has historical exhibits, such as a life-size replica of a traditional Vietnamese village in the Orange County fairgrounds – part of plans to have more historically resonant exhibits, both to teach non-Vietnamese about the culture and to honor 40 years of Vietnamese Americans in Orange County.

"I like the photo exhibits and all the history," said Jeff Hanson, who traveled from San Diego with his girlfriend, Rebecca Ye. "I used to live in Korea, so I love Asian culture."

The UVSA had for years held its annual Tet celebration in Garden Grove. But failed contract negotiations in the fall of 2013 forced the UVSA to move its 2014 festival to Costa Mesa.

The Vietnamese Community of Southern California stepped up at the last minute and put on a Garden Grove festival on the fly.

This is the first year the two major Tet festivals are on the same weekend, meaning they are competing to attract many of the same people and vendors.

"We chose to have a booth (in Garden Grove) because it is closer to the Vietnamese community," said Peter Chau, who was passing out pamphlets for The Church of Orange in Santa Ana. "But I may visit the one in Costa Mesa, look around and if it's good, maybe next year we will go there."

Those who attend the festivals, though, don't reside exclusively in Orange County. Attendees come from all over the country, from San Diego to Boston, for the new year – a time of family and community gathering.

"I'm really interested in all the changes this year," said Marlon Lam of Orange. "It's much bigger than last year. I really like the village."











Crosby was his nephew, Bladen Crosby.

Crosby is a former Garden Grove resident. where he attended Pacifica High School in Garden Grove and graduated from La Quinta High in Fountain Valley.

In 1998, Crosby was selected by the Angels in the 34th round of the Major League Baseball draft, However, he opted to play college baseball at Cal State Long Beach.

He was Rookie of the Year in 2004. In 2001, Crosby was selected by the Oakland Athletics in the first round and was

the 25th pick of the Major League Baseball draft.

In 2004, Crosby's first full MLB season, he took over the Athletics' shortstop duties. That year, Crosby hit .239 with 22 home runs and 64 RBI. He also led American League rookies with 130 hits and 34 doubles, with 48 walks.

Those numbers earned him Rookie of the Year, the sixth Athletics player to do so; he was the second shortstop in a row to win the award and he was also the eighth shortstop in 22 seasons to earn top rookie honors.

Crosby was just a vote shy of Riding in the parade car with being the unanimous pick, despite

> his batting average being the lowest ever for a Rookie of the Year. He struck out 141 times. fourth-most in the AL and the team's most

Crosby and the Oakland Athletics agreed to a five-vear contract in 2005, where he was moved to utility infielder and the Pittsburgh Pirates signed Crosby as a free agent in 2009 where he appeared in 61 games, batting .224. The Pirates traded Crosby to the Arizona Diamondbacks in 2010.

He batted .167 and was released in August of that year.

He was signed in a minor league deal with Milwaukee Brewers, but after hitting poorly in spring training and not showing improvement, Crosby was released by the Brewers in 2013.

He is the son of former major league infielder Ed Crosby and mother Kathy.



Unlike Western jam, which is usually in liquid form and served with bread, "Vietnamese jam" is mainly in dry form, usually dried fruits and some kind of seeds (pumpkin seeds, sunflower seeds, watermelon seeds). This once-in-year mix of snack is very large in variety, with so many tastes: ginger, carrot, coconut, pineapple, pumpkin, lotus seed, star fruit, sweet potato.

On the costumes: Most of these can be seen at the parade on Bolsa Avenue in Westminster (the festival is held in Garden Grove). A picture really is worth a thousand words, so I'm not going to spend a thousand words describing the costumes. Just check out Loreen Berlin's photos in this paper. Stunning!

On the family fun: There were games, arts and crafts and shopping. And... too many cute children to count.

What else should you know about Tet? The Vietnamese use many kinds of flowers and plants to decorate their houses during Tet, which celebrates the Lunar New Year. It's common to see chrysanths, marigolds, mao ga flowers, paper white flowers and On the food: there was sticky lavender. But there are three

rice (xoi), sausage (cha), candied that are an absolute must in Vietnamese culture: peach flower. ochna integerrima and marumi kumquat.

> The Vietnamese are big on toasts and well-wishing. At Tet. you may wish someone a happy new year and/or many other things. Here are a handful that I hear every year at Tet:

> I wish you a wealthy new year. I wish that you will get promoted in the new year.

> I wish that the new year will bring health to all your family.

New year, new triumphs.

All wishes come true.

New lover will come in the new year. Note: this one's for single people.

And now, drum roll please, my favorite wish of them all. Full disclosure: I'm a frugal person, so I repeat the second part of this wish to my husband, who never saw a restaurant special he didn't want to try.

Money influx is as strong as Da's river; expenditure is as little as dripping coffee.

Spend as little as dripping coffee. Isn't that great? Sounds like something financial whiz Suze Orman would say.



With an exceptionally strong cast, special mention must go to



California City Solutions: Napa Transforms Economic Development Through Flood Protection Project

This story is part of an ongoing series featuring Helen Putnam Award entries. The 2014 entries are available on the League's website as a resource for cities in a searchable database called <u>California City Solutions</u>. Napa's Downtown Riverfront Improvement Integrated with Flood Protection project was submitted in 2014 for the Community Services and Economic Development award category.

The Napa River is a significant estuary system, delivering fresh water from Mt. St. Helena down to the San Pablo Bay and eventually on to the San Francisco Bay. Six miles of the lower river meander through the city of Napa, flowing right through the edge of its downtown district and many residential areas. After experiencing many devastating floods and attempts at flood control, the voters approved a local flood tax. With this funding, and more than a decade of planning, the Napa River-Napa Creek Flood Protection Project took root and began transitioning a floodplain while increasing economic development for the city. construction of four major bridge replacements, provided necessary environmental cleanup and positioned riverside properties for future development.

The project preserved historic and low-income housing on the west side of the river, while cleaning up contamination and expanding the floodplain to the east. The city advocated for riverside trails to be incorporated into the project design ensuring that areas such as Veterans Memorial Park and the Oxbow Bypass were designed and funded as usable public space amenities rather than simply water conveyance or detention areas. The city contributed funding for projects that were not covered by federal components and private sector developments.

After six years of construction, the city started seeing results. The damage from a New Year's Day Flood in 2006 was far less than it would have been if a number of project components had not been completed. Dozens of species of fish, birds and mammals began to repopulate areas where they had not been seen in decades. Contemporary hotels, offices, retail and housing replaced blighted and underused properties along the river's edge, increasing economic development for the city.

The Great Recession hindered the pace of the project, but the city used the slowdown to develop a Downtown Specific Plan. It specified public improvements, a public art ordinance, creating a permanent funding source for public art, and a Tourism Improvement District, establishing a dependable funding source for destination marketing. Investors have renewed private development efforts, new businesses are filling once-vacant spaces, and businesses that weathered the recession are now prospering.

As of mid-2014, the city was experiencing a strong economic rebound, which was accelerating the completion of river trails and its third pocket park on the riverfront. The crucial Oxbow Bypass is on the verge of construction – the next major milestone in providing flood protection with space for a public park.

The total public and private investment (real estate transactions and construction) in the riverfront/ downtown area since 1996 now tops \$1.16 billion, with just under \$1 billion of this amount from private investment.

League Takes an Oppose Unless Amended Position on DOF Redevelopment Dissolution Budget Proposal

Cities Urged to Take Immediate Action

The League board of directors last week voted unanimously to oppose unless amended Gov. Jerry Brown's proposal to make changes to the redevelopment dissolution process as part of the FY 2015-16 budget. The recently released <u>language to the proposal</u> is anticipated to be included in a budget trailer bill. The proposal contains a number of significantly harmful provisions to local agencies that would reverse recent court decisions regarding the redevelopment dissolution process, undo previous incentives and limit transparency, accountability and opportunities for local agencies to protect their legal rights. Board of Equalization Acts to Reduce Variable Gas Tax Rate Sen. Jim Beall Introduces Bill to Provide More Stability

The <u>State Board of Equalization</u> (BOE) yesterday approved a 6 cent per gallon decrease, from 18 cents to 12 cents, in the state variable tax on gasoline for FY 2015-16. This action will result in a dramatic decrease in the variable gas tax revenues received by cities. The decrease is more than the Department of Finance's projected 5.5 cent reduction, but is lower than the BOE staff recommendation of a 7.5 cent reduction. The decrease will take effect July 1. Assembly Speaker Announces Democrats Affordable Housing Plan

Assembly Speaker Toni Atkins (D-San Diego) today announced the <u>Assembly Democrat's plan</u> to introduce several legislative measures focused on creating more affordable housing in California. The Speaker was joined by California Treasurer John Chiang, Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti, as well as Assembly Members Ed Chau (D-Alhambra) Jimmy Gomez (D-Los Angeles) and David Chiu (D-San Francisco). *For more, see Page 3*.

but the current reality with automobile transportation fuels is both a slackening of demand and a downward trend in prices. The result is the dramatic downturn in the estimated allocations in FY 2015-16 from the prior year.

The variable gas tax rate has seen significant increases and decreases since the BOE adjustment process was implemented. The resulting instability has had a significant impact on state and local agency ability to plan for future projects. In response, Sen. Jim Beall (D-San Jose) introduced SB 321 that would allow BOE to make partial adjustments of the rate over a three year period — a process referred to as "smoothing." It would also authorize BOE to adjust the rate on a quarterly basis if the board makes a determination that the amount of revenues generated by the motor vehicle fuel tax will be significantly different than the original estimates made by the board. This important bill is expected to be expedited through the process in order to take effect before the start of the new fiscal year.

Cities can expect more information on this effort shortly. In addition, <u>CaliforniaCityFinance.com</u> is preparing to distribute updated city by city estimates of FY 2015-16 gas tax allocations that incorporate the BOE action.

The plan announced this afternoon seeks to recompense for the loss of over \$1 billion per year of redevelopment housing funds, a critical state funding source. Speaker Atkins said that her plan provides a more permanent source of funding that would allow the state to fund existing programs at dependable levels, and create a more reliable and efficient mechanism than the occasional housing bond.

The proposal would:

- Establish a permanent source of funding for affordable housing by placing a \$75 fee on real estate transaction documents, excluding home sales;
- Increase the state's Low Income Housing Tax Credit by \$300 million;
- Provide legislation to create a framework for how California will spend any funds received from the <u>National Housing Trust Fund</u> that are expected to flow to states in 2016; and
- Use a portion of the <u>Proposition 47</u> funds to reduce recidivism through investment in rapid rehousing and housing supports for formerly incarcerated Californians.

According to estimates, the proposal would generate approximately \$500 million annually statewide for affordable housing needs via the proposed \$75 recordation fee on real estate transactions with the exception of home sales —a provision identical to a failed bill the League supported last legislative session, <u>SB 391 (DeSaulnier)</u>. The Speaker's plan also estimates that for every \$500 million spent on affordable housing, approximately 29,000 jobs would be created.

Detailed provisions of the bill package have yet to be released, but are expected sometime later this week. The League will monitor the progress of the proposed bill package and inform members of developments as it makes its way through the legislative process.
